

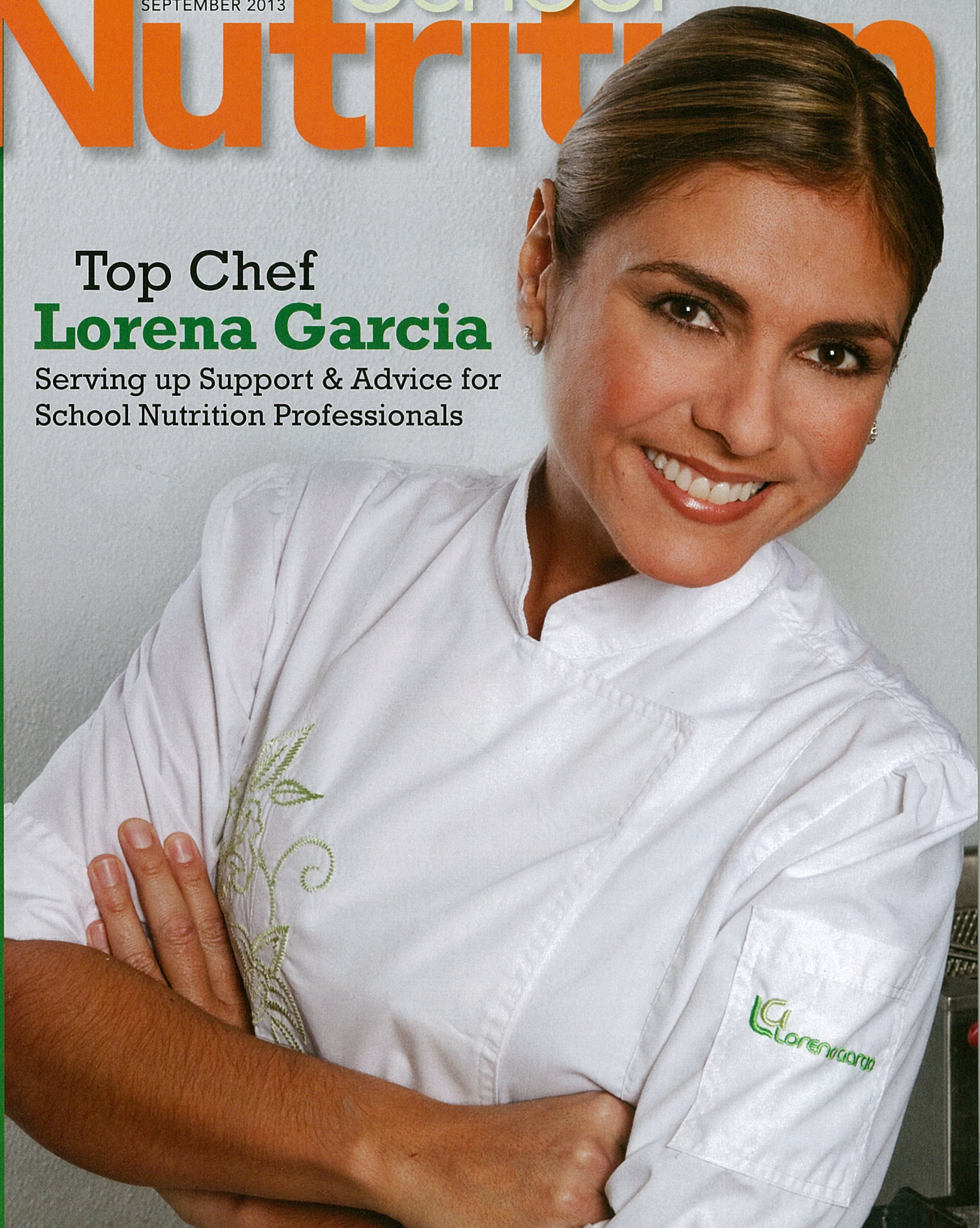

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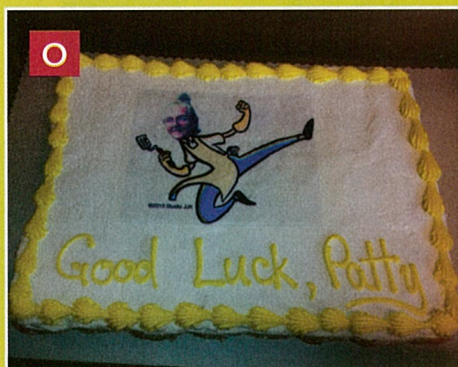

Fountains of Knowledge This year's ANC offered more than 90 education sessions that covered an assortment of topics for school nutrition professionals at all career levels. Attendees had the

ANC By the Numbers

- More than **5,900** school nutrition operators, vendors and advocates participated in ANC 2013. Among these were **460** first-time attendees.
- The school nutrition professionals in attendance represented **787** districts and more than **14.3 million** students from all across the country.
- SNA's Political Action Committee raised more than **\$2,300** to support the Association's legislative advocacy efforts.
- Good luck to the **25** individuals who sat for the School Nutrition Specialist (SNS) credentialing exam on Saturday morning.

- More than **360** companies exhibited their products at ANC; exhibitors showcased food, beverage, equipment and technology products and services to the attendees visiting the sold-out **849**-booth Exhibit Hall.
- Some **500** attendees took advantage of special reserved time in the Exhibit Hall to complete the Directors-Only All-Access Pass. A lucky **14** winners won free registrations to SNA's 3 2014 national meetings, courtesy of **14** generous sponsors.
- Attendees made sure not to miss the **6** culinary demos presented by California Olive Committee & California Cling Peach Board,

- ConAgra Mills, General Mills Foodservice, McCormick For Chefs, Mushroom Council and Sunkist Foodservice. In addition, they checked out **2** presentations from Heartland School Solutions and Winston Industries in the Cutting-Edge Complex. More than **20** vendors displayed brand-new products in the New Product Showcase.
- More than **40** posters highlighted recent child nutrition research and innovative projects and initiatives in the Child Nutrition Showcase.
- More than **11,500 pounds** of food from the Exhibit Hall were donated to a local food bank.

A variety of repeated Hot Topic sessions ensured that the most timely and popular issues—primarily related to the meal pattern changes for breakfast and lunch—could be worked into everyone's agenda. A selection of sessions was geared specifically to those directors new to the K-12 segment. Love of Discovery The consistently exciting and dynamic Exhibit Hall is always a must-visit priority for ANC attendees Monday through Wednesday. Why? Well, consider that the classic Rodgers and Hammerstein musical "Oklahoma!" asserted that "everything's up to date in Kansas City." That declaration, written in 1943, certainly held true 70 years later, with nearly 850 booths showcasing more new products and resources than anyone could count! As eager attendees canvassed the Exhibit Hall, they sampled products, collected valuable information and connected with current and potential vendor partners.

But business wasn't the only name of the Exhibit Hall game—indeed, many booths engaged attendees in creative games and activities, including *School Nutrition's* own "What's Ruby Reading?" promotional contest (see page 8). When foot-sore attendees chose to seek out some well-deserved rest and relaxation, they made time to stop by the Wellness Village to recharge with free massages and take advantage of other resources focused on personal well-being. 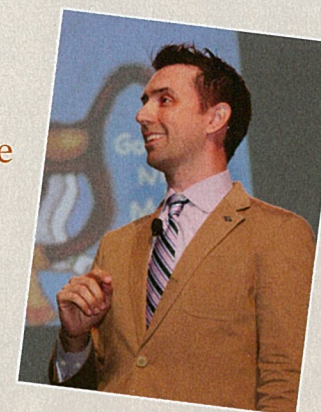

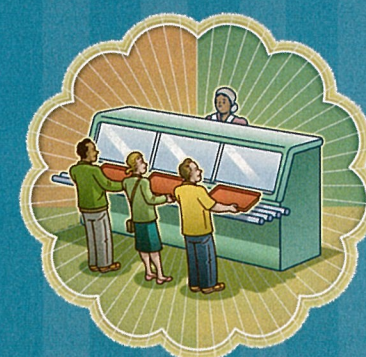
