# The Law


To help combat childhood obesity and improve children health, the Child Nutrition and WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004 (PL # 108-265) requires each local educational agency that receives funding for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Child Nutrition Program to establish a local school wellness policy.

With this new requirement, the U.S. Congress recognizes that schools play a critical role in creating a healthy environment for the preventions of childhood obesity and for combating problems, like Type 2 Diabetes, that are associated with poor nutrition and physical inactivity.

To help combat childhood obesity the Tunica County School Board adopts this Wellness Policy with the following commitments to implementing a coordinated approach to school health. This policy is designed to effectively utilize schools and community resources and to equitably serve the needs and interest of all students and staff at Robinsonville Elementary School, taking into consideration differences in culture.

### Commitment to Nutrition

- ➤ Offer a school lunch program with menus that meet the meal patters and nutrition standards established by the U.S Department of Agriculture and the Mississippi Department of Education, Office of Child Nutrition Programs.
- ➤ Offer school breakfast and snack program (where approved and applicable) with menus that meet the meal patterns and nutrition standards established by the U.S Department of Agriculture and the Mississippi Department of Education, Office of Child Nutrition Programs.
- Promote participation in school meals programs to families and staff.
- ➤ Operate all Child Nutrition Programs with school foodservice staff who are properly qualified according to current professional standards (Mississippi Board of Education Policy, Code EE-2E).
- Follow State Board of Education policies on competitive foods and extra food sales (Mississippi Board of Education policy, Code EEH).
- ➤ Implement Nutrition Standards as adopted by the State Board of Education in accordance with Mississippi Healthy Student Act (State Board of Education Policy 4011).
  - Healthy food and beverage choices:
  - Healthy food preparation;
  - Marketing of healthy food choices to students and staff;
  - Food preparation ingredients and products;

- Minimum/maximum time allotted for students and staff to eat breakfast and lunch;
- Availability of food items during the lunch and breakfast periods of the Child Nutrition Breakfast and Lunch Program;
- Methods to increase participation in the Child Nutrition School Breakfast and Lunch Programs.
- Established guidelines in accordance with the Mississippi Beverage and Snack Regulations for all foods available on the school campus during the school day with objective of promoting students health and reducing childhood obesity.
- Provide nutrition information for parents, including nutrition analysis of school meals and resources to help parent improve food that they serve at home.
- Eliminate use of foods as rewards for student's accomplishments and the withholding of food as punishment (e.g., restricting a child's selection of flavored milk at meals due to behavior problems).
- Encourage all school-based organizations to use services, contests, non-food items, and/or healthful foods for fundraising programs. The sale of candy and donuts are prohibited.

# Commitment to Food Safe Schools

- Implement a food safety program based on HACCP principles for all school meals, as required by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Mississippi Department of Education, Office of Child Nutrition Program and ensure that the food service permit is current for the school site.
  - Develop a food safety education plan for all staff and students, consistent with Fight BAC and other national standards for safe food handling at home and in school.
  - Ensure that all staff has viewed the video developed by the Office of Healthy Schools to support food safety on the school campus. For compliance with the Nutrition Standards all staff must complete and sign pre and post test developed By the Office of Healthy Schools and maintains documentation of completion.
  - All school personnel including School Board Members will receive copies of the Local School Wellness Policy to include food safety policies and procedures and relevant professional development. Examples of professional development include, but are not limited to, the video developed by the Office of Healthy Schools and Eating Safely at School, developed by the National School Boards Association.

- Adequate access to hand washing facilities and supplies will be available whenever and wherever students, staff and families prepare, handle or consume food.
- The food safety assurance plan must address strategies that minimize risks for students and staff who have food allergies and intolerances.

# Commitment to Pipysical Activity/Physical Education

## Robinsonville Elementary School will:

- ➢ Provide 100 minutes per week of activity-based instruction for all students in grades Pre-k 5 (in accordance with section 37-13-134, Mississippi Code of 1972, ann., reference 2004 Mississippi Public School Accountability Standard 32, Appendix B and 33). Robinsonville Elementary will provide 50 minutes of classroom P.E. instruction and 15 minutes of activity time with classroom teacher.
- Incorporate Physical Education/Activity in accordance with the Physical Education Rules and Regulations as approved by the State Board of Education in Compliance with the Mississippi fitness testing for students.
- Offer a planned sequential program of physical education instruction incorporating individual and group activities, which are student centered and taught in a positive environment.
- Provide instruction using the 2006 Mississippi Physical Education Framework.
- Implement the requirement of the Mississippi Healthy Students Act of 2007 (Senate Bill 2369).

# Commitment to Comprehensive Health Education

- ➢ Incorporate instruction based on the 2006 Mississippi Comprehensive Health Framework for grades 0-12 (2004 Mississippi Public School Accountability Standards 20, Appendix A).
- Implement the requirements of the Mississippi Healthy Students Act 2007, which requires 45 minutes per week of health education instruction as defined by the State Board of Education for grades K through 8. This is provide currently now by classroom teachers in conjunction with Science Curriculum.

# Robinsonville Elementary School/TSCD Maintenance Department/Transportation Department will:

- Ensure that there are no pad locks or chains on exit doors; exits should never be obstructed (in accordance with Mississippi State Fire Code). Ensure that all signs are illuminated and clearly visible.
- Ensure that all chemicals are stored properly (in accordance with the Material Safety Data Sheet).
- Refer to the U. S. consumer Product Safety Commission's Handbook for Public Playground Safety; for federal guidelines for playground safety.
- Ensure that fire extinguishers are inspected each year and properly tagged.
- Complete yearly maintenance of the heating and cooling systems in your school; check coils, filters, belts, etc., in order to maintain safe operation and healthy air quality.
- Conduct at least one or more evacuation drills per month.
- Ensure that two means of egress are available in each classroom in case of an emergency; if there is only one door, designate a window (properly sized) as a means of egress.
- Never use extension cords as a permanent source of electricity anywhere on a school campus.
- Comply with the applicable rules and regulations of the State Board of Education in the operation of its transportation program (in accordance with the MS Code 37-41-53; State Board of Education Policies 7903, 7904, 7909; and Accreditation Standard #35).
  - Inspect all buses on a quarterly basis and ensure that they are well maintained and cleaned
  - Require all bus drivers to have a valid bus driver certificate and a commercial driver's license and operates the bus according to all specified safety procedures. Maintain a record of yearly motor vehicle reports on each bus driver and evidence that each driver has received two hours of in-service training per semester. (SB Policy 7903)
  - Ensure arrival of all buses at their designated school sites prior to the start of the instructional day.

- Conduct bus evacuation drills at least two times a year. (SB Policy 7903)
- ➤ Provides facilities that meet the criteria of: (MS Code 37-7-301 © (d) (j); 37-11-5, 49 and 45-11-101; and Accreditation Standard#36).
  - Provide facilities that are clean.
  - Provide facilities that are safe.
  - Provide proper signage that explains tobacco, weapons, and drugs are prohibited on the school campus and at school functions.
  - Provide operational facilities that are equipped and functional to meet the instructional needs of students and staff (in accordance with the Mississippi School Design Guidelines).
  - o Provide air conditioning in all classrooms, Code 37-17-6(2) (2000).
- > Comply with the requirements for Safe and Healthy Schools:
  - Maintain a comprehensive School Safety Plan on file that has been approved annually by the local school board. (MS Code 37-3-81 and 37-3-82 (2); and Accreditation Standard #37.1); see the School Safety Manual and the MDE School Occupational Safety and Crisis Response Plan.
  - State Board FBB (1990) prohibits the possession of pistols, firearms or weapons by any person on school premises or at school functions. Code 37-11-18 (1996) requires any students who possesses a knife, a handgun, other firearm or any other instrument considered to be dangerous and capable of causing bodily harm or who commit a violent act on educational property be subject to automatic expulsion for one calendar year. The superintendent of the school is authorized to modify the period of time for expulsion on a case-by-case basis.
- Prohibits students from possessing tobacco on any educational property, Criminal Code 97-32-9 (200) further prohibits the use of tobacco on any educational property for adult who, if in violation, would be subject to a fine and issued a citation by a law enforcement officer. Educational property is defined as any public school building or bus, campus, grounds, athletic field, or other property used or operated during a school related activity.

Commiment to Quality Health Services

- > Ensure school nurse is working under the guidelines of the Mississippi School Nurse Procedures and Standards of Care.
- Offer comprehensive health services for students in grades K-5, through the employment of school nurse, as a means to academic success.
- Collaborate with other school staff to provide health services as part of a Coordinated School Health Program.
- Work with students, parents, and local healthcare providers to effectively manage and treat chronic diseases.
- Promote healthy lifestyles through school and community events (PTA meetings, open houses, health fairs, teacher in-services, and other events)
- Participate in administrative claiming for reimbursement of administrative cost associated with health and medical outreach.

- Adhere to the details outlined in the Licensure Guidelines (451) when hiring Guidance Counselors and Psychologists. The state does not have a policy specifically outlining the requirements for a school social worker. For licensure as a social worker in the state of Mississippi, a candidate must: provide verification of a baccalaureate degree in a social work from a college or university accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) or Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) and scores a minimum of 70 on the ASWB exam.
- Ensure that all elementary school students have access to qualified students support personnel such as: guidance counselors, social worker, nurses, psychologist, psychometrics, and others (as required by the Mississippi Public School Accountability Standards, Process Standards 6.1 and 6.2).
- Hire school guidance counselors with a minimum of a Master's Degree in Guidance and counseling, or in an emergency situation, an appropriate certification as determined by the Commission on Teacher and Administrator Education, Certification and Licensure and Development.
- ➢ Hire school counselors who agree to abide by the American School Counselor Association Code of Ethics.
- > Ensure that all guidance counselors provide comprehensive counseling services such as:
  - Academic and personal/social counseling
  - Student assessment and assessment counseling
  - Career and educational counseling
  - Individual and group counseling
  - o Crisis intervention and preventive counseling
  - Referrals to community agencies
  - Educational consultations and collaborations with teacher, administrators, parents and community leaders

- o Education and career placement services
- o Follow-up counseling services
- Conflict resolution
- o Other counseling duties or other duties as assigned by the school principal

# Robinsonville Elementary School will:

- Give parents and community the opportunity to serve on the School Health Council.
- Involve families and students in health education learning activities at home, including homework for health instruction, personal goal setting for healthy behaviors, and other health education-related activities.
- Develop homework assignments for students that involve family discussions about health topics and age-related health issues.
- Encourage family meal times at home to enhance both nutrient intake of children and their successful performance at school.

# Commitment to implementing a Quality Staff Wellness Brogram

# Robinsonville Elementary School will:

- Provide healthy drink choices in the vending machines located in teacher's lounges, and offer water, low fat milk, and 100% fruit juice to staff members.
- Provide health promotion programs for school staff to include opportunities for physical activity, health screenings, nutrition education, weight management, smoking cessation, and stress reduction and management.
- Implement a healthy weight program for staff, such as Weight Watchers at Work Program.
- Develop relationships with community health providers (e.g., local health departments, hospitals, neighborhood clinics, health professionals), recreational facilities, voluntary health organizations (e.g., American Cancer Society, American Lung Association, American Heart Association), and other community members who can provide resources for or support school employee wellness activities.
- Ensure that all staff are aware of the Mississippi State and School Employees' Health Insurance Plan that has been enhance to include *Motivating Mississippi: Keys to Living Healthy,* a new wellness and health promotion program designed to help individuals live a healthy lifestyle and increase their overall wellness benefit amount.

# Commitment to Warketing a Healthy School Environment

- Promote healthful eating, physical activity and healthy lifestyles to students, teachers, parents, administrators and the community at school events (e.g., school registration, parent-teacher conference, PTA meetings, open house, health fairs, teachers in-service, and other events.
- Provide positive, motivating messages, both verbal and non-verbal, about healthy lifestyle practices throughout the school setting. All school personnel will help these positive messages.
- > Eliminate advertising and other materials on the school campus that promote foods of minimal nutrition value.

# Commitment to implementation

# Robinsonville Elementary School will:

- > Establish a plan for implementation of the School Wellness Policy.
- Designate one or more persons to insure that the School Wellness Policy is implemented as written.
- ➤ Establish and support a School Health Council that addresses all aspects of a coordinated school health program, including a school wellness policy (Mississippi Code of 1972 Annotated, Section 37-13-134).
- Conduct a review of the progress toward school wellness policy goals each year to identify areas for improvement.
- Prepare and submit a yearly report to the school board regarding the progress toward implementation of the school wellness policy and recommendations for any revisions to the policy as necessary.
