The APS District Wellness Council, consisting of community stakeholders, APS personnel, parents, and students, meets twice per school year. A sub-committee meets throughout the school year to plan events such as the Student Wellness Ambassador Leadership Academy, Strong 4 Life events, and annual District Back-2-School Bash community event. Individual schools have wellness committees that are required to submit a Local School Wellness Plan, a Local School Wellness Plan Evaluation, and meet throughout the school year. It is recommended that schools meet four (4) times per year as a benchmark noted in our Local School Wellness Plan. Schools are asked to report how many times their wellness council meets per school year.</p> <p>APS maintains a plan for implementation and execution of the policy through the District Wellness Council and the local school wellness plan and wellness evaluations submitted by each school annually. Progress for any wellness-related goals is tracked using the Local School Wellness Plans (submitted in the fall semester) and Local School Wellness Plan Evaluations (submitted in the spring semester.)</p>
